A correspondent gives us some additional information in regard to the fishing arrangements at Ingham Springs, near New Hope, Pa. He says that Ingham Springs, on which the fish farm is located, has a flow, by actual measurement of 3,680 gallons per minute. For fish culture it has few, if any, equals. It is said to be a model for any body to pattern after. They have a hatching house, capable of hatching 1,000,000 of fish at a time. They have now in the house 20,000 eggs in the process of hatching, and expect to increase it to 150,000 by the first of February. There are a few ponds finished. In one of them there are a few hundred wild trout taken from the creek that will weigh one pound and over each. In pond No. 2, they have more, but smaller, caught in the same stream. Ten thousand yearlings have been purchased which are to be added to the present stock in February. "If the States of Pennsylvania and New Jersey," says our correspondent, "will pass a law protecting the fish nets and weirs, the Delaware River will be stocked with salmon next Spring. We have agreed to hatch 500,000 of them."
